Official Bulletin 1

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Bulgarian National Karate Federation

In 1992 the Bulgarian National Karate Federation was founded. It incorporated the WKF recognized styles Wado Ryu, Goju Ryu, Shito Ryu and Shotokan. After 1998 the Kyokushin karate clubs became members of the federation as well. The Bulgarian National Karate Federation has 84 membering clubs and is one of the largest in numbers in the country today. There is almost no city in the country whithout a functioning karate club whith mainly young people who are striving to seep in the secrets of karate. Today the people practicing karate in Bulgaria are more than 20 000.

Bulgarian karatekas have a constant presence on the international tatami. Our masters along with the Kyokushin ones' form a long list of European and World champions.

The referee panel of BNFK is comprised of Balkan, European and World category judges.

Bulgaria is the only country on the Balkans where karate is an official degree course in the National Sports Academy. The karate course was introduced in the curriculum in 1992. The students accepted to study karate annually who complete the full course of education acquire a bachelor or masters degree.

Arena Armeec Sofia has 12 373 seats, 2256 of which are placed on the long telescopic stands, 1248 on the short telescopic stands and 206 VIP seats placed in a separate zone accessible from level 2. After accessing level 1 all the elevators can be used to reach level 3, where 60 seats for disabled persons are provided. There are also 12 WCs for disabled persons placed on all levels.

There are 96 seats specially equipped for journalists.

The Dimensions of the hall depend on whether the telescopic stands are folded or unfolded.

Folded telescopic stands: width-53,20 m; length-77,20 m

Unfolded telescopic stands width-32,80 m; length-56,80 m

The media cube has 4 displays with dimensions 520/380 cm. The pixel step is 10 mm and the transmition signal is – MPEG 2 Standart 16/9.

There are also two identical digital scoreboards.

The hall is equipped with 11 elevators, 16 refreshment areas, 9 cloakrooms, 30 entrances and 202 toilets for spectators. There are 2 TIR gateways with maxim 4.5 meters clearance in sector D0. There are 2 electrical switchboards prepared for supporting concert or other events in sector D0. There are 4 TV decks prepared for supporting TV coverage of the events, placed in the four sectors of the hall.

The warm up hall is situated on Level -1 with dimensions: Width - 22,10 m, Length - 30,00 m, Height - 3,20 m

The VIP boxes are situated on level 2 in sectors A2, B2 and C2 with total capacity of 206 seats. Some of the VIP boxes can be arranged as offices if needed. Most of them have their own sink and some are equipped with WC. The access to the VIP boxes is organized with separate elevators and staircases.









There are 16 refreshment areas, situated on Levels 0, 1, 3, offering snacks and refreshing drinks.

Doping control room

The doping control zone is situated on the level -1 and has 2 rooms for doping tests as well as waiting areas in front of them.

Offices

Offices designed for serving the different types of events are situated on levels:

Level -1 - 6rooms, one of which can be used as a meeting

Level 2-4 rooms for representative purposes with view to the hall, each of them with a possibility to be used as a VIP box.

The Training hall is designed to function as a supplementary sports facility while big sports events are taking place in the main hall. It can also function as a fully independent facility.

There are 2 dressing rooms in the Training hall, every one of them equipped with individual lockers, benches, 4 sinks, 2 WCs and 4 showers.

There are 887 parking lots, 614 of them placed in a central exterior parking, 231 placed in near streets and 42 dimensioned for disabled persons. There are also 8 bus lots and 8 parking lots for TIRs and other heavy machines. The inner transportation street reaches all the entrances of the hall and has a length of 923 m. Two ramps give the access to the level -1 of the hall, where a 97 car parking lots for VIPs and administration is placed.

Transportation and Transfers

The transportation will be arranged according to the number of participants in your delegation. In case you require any extra service, please contact the organizers. Transportation will be organized by taxi, mini bus or bus, depending on the number of participants on each arrival. Depending on the number of persons in each delegation a bus or taxi or other vehicle will be used. Transportation to the hotels will be only offered from Sofia airports.

Visa Policy and customs

Since 1 January 2007, the Republic of Bulgaria has been a member of the EU and so enforces the General Visa Policy of the European Union, in keeping with the conditions of the Accession Treaty.

At present, Bulgaria issues only national visas, which do not give visitors the right to enter the Schengen area. Visas are issued by the diplomatic and consular representatives of the Republic of Bulgaria, or by representatives of another member state of the European Union with which Bulgaria has an agreement for the presentation and acceptance of applications for visas and the issuance of visas.

Available visa types are as follows:

Airport transit (visa type "A");

Short-term stay (visa type "C");

Long-term stay (visa type "D").

A fee is charged for the issuance of visas, according to the Fee Tariff No 3.




BULGARIA founded 681 AD




he territory of Bulgaria has been inhabited since antiquity, as the country's many ancient settlements and burial mounds attest. Present-day Bulgaria was a cradle of some of the earliest civilizations in Europe — the oldest gold ornament ever discovered, unearthed in the Chalcholite necropolis near Varna, is evidence of that. From the age of Ancient Thrace we have inherited valuable cultural monuments, including tombs (such as the Kazanlak tomb, the Aleksandrovska tomb, and the Sveshtarska tomb); treasures (the Panagyursko, Rogozensko, and Valchitransko teasures, among others); and sanctuaries and temples (at Perperikon, Starosel, Kozi Gramadi, Begliktash, and elsewhere).



The cultural interaction between the Thracians and the Hellenistic civilization were particularly dynamic. Many cities and towns heavily influenced by Greek culture were established between 6th-2nd century BC in Thrace, Misia and along the shores of the Black Sea. In the middle of the 1st century AD, all Bulgarian lands became a part of the Roman Empire. Many architectural and archaeological monuments have been preserved from this period, such as the Ancient Theater and the Roman Stadium in Plovdiv, and remains of the Roman cities Ulpia Escus, Nove, Nikopolis ad Istrum, Nikopolis ad Nestum, Augusta Trayana, and Abritus.









After the dissolution of the Roman Empire, the present Bulgarian lands came under the control of the East Roman Empire, later called Byzantium by historians. In the second half of the 7th century, the proto-Bulgarians settled in what is now Northeast Bulgaria. They united with the Slavs to form the Bulgarian state, recognized by Byzantium in 681. The head of the state was the leader of proto-Bulgarians Khan Asparuh, and the city of Pliska was declared the state's capital.

In 864, during the reign of Tzar Boris I (852-889), Bulgarians adopted Christianity as its official religion, which makes Bulgaria one of the oldest Christian states in Europe.


At the end of the 9th century, the brothers Cyril and Methodius created and disseminated the Slavic alphabet (Cyrillic).

Bulgaria's first constitution was adopted in 1879, and was one of the most democratic constitutions of its time.

The democratic changes in Bulgaria started at the end of 1989, when multi-party elections were held and a new constitution was adopted. At this time Bulgaria began its transition to democratic development and a market economy. Since 1991, Bulgaria has been a member of the Council of Europe, and in 2004 Bulgaria became a member of NATO. In 1995, it filed an application to join the European Union, with negotiations commencing in 1999. On 25 April 2005, the Accession Treaty granting the Republic of Bulgaria the right to join the European Union was signed in Luxemburg. On 1 January 2007, after fulfilling all membership criteria, Bulgaria became of full-fl in Luxemburg was signed edged member of the European Union.











ifestyles and cultures in what is now Bulgaria have developed over thousands of years. The country is located at the crossroad between Europe and Asia, and the lands of Bulgaria have been populated since antiquity. The Slavs and proto-Bulgarians were greatly influenced by the cultures of the Thracians, Illyrians and Greeks, and all peoples who resided on these lands - Thracians, Romans, Slavs, and Bulgarians - have contributed to the world's cultural heritage. It is no accident that the earliest European civilization grew up here. Some of the most famous treasures in the world were discovered at the Varna necropolis, including the worlds oldest golden ornaments; There are Thracian tombs and sanctuaries in Kazanlak, Sveshtari, Starosel, Aleksandrovo, Perperikon, and Tatul. A large number of other golden artifacts have been found, in the Panagyurishte, Valchitran, Rogozen, and elsewhere. The remains of the Thracian, Hellenistic and Roman culture are many and varied. In the dozens of Thracians tombs that have been discovered, there are unique remains attesting to the high material and spiritual culture of antiquity. Entire city complexes had been found -Augusta Trayana, Trimontium, Nikopolis ad Istrum, Pautalia, Akre, Mesemvria, Apolonia, Serdika and many others. The traditions, festivals, customs, and rituals preserved by Bulgarians through the ages are evidence of the country's profound spirituality and its dynamic lifestyle and culture.

The Rose is the symbol of Bulgaria. Rose picking, one of the oldest and traditional customs of Bulgarians, has become primarily a tourist attraction.









here are a number of architectural reserves in the country that preserve the unique Bulgarian architecture from the age of the Revival (18th – 19th centuries) – Koprivshtitsa, Tryavna, Bozhentsi, Zheravna, Bansko, and Melnik, among others. In some of the ethnographic complexes, such as Etara, Zlatograd, and Old Dobrich, tourists can appreciate first-hand Bulgarian customs and handicrafts, since residents continue to make articles according to old techniques passed down from generation to generation.


During the Bulgarian Revival, the monasteries served as centers of artistic and educational activity. There are still many working monasteries in the country — Rila Monastery, Bachkovo Monastery, Troyan Monastery, Zemen Monastery, Glozhene Monastery, Kilifarevo Monastery, Shipchenski Monastery, and others. Our country is also famous for its well-established national traditions of icon painting and wood carving. The best known icons and carvings are from Samokov, Tryavna and Bansko.

Bulgaria's museums preserve valuable collections of domestic, cultural and military articles; statues, burial steles and monuments; masks, mosaics, and small statuettes of ancient gods; and many other precious exhibits.

Bulgarians have developed their culture and enriched it over the millennia, and they preserve it and continue to develop it to the present day. In more recent times, Bulgarians have also had reason to take pride in their literature, arts, music, and architecture. A proof of ongoing involvement is Bulgaria's rich cultural calendar of national and international festivals for young and old alike, as well as other gatherings, cultural events, and expositions.









SUMMER TOURISM

The Bulgarian Black Sea coast is a wonderful place for a summer holiday. Cape Emine is the place where the Balkan Mountains meet the sea, and this place conditionally divides the Black Sea coast into a northern and southern part. The coastline is 378 km long, with 209 beaches that have a total area of 16 square kilometers. Many are wide, while others are small and nested in picturesque marine bays. The beaches and the sea offer excellent conditions for various water sports such as surfing, water skiing, diving, underwater exploration, and fishing, whether from the surface or underwater. In 2011, the beaches at Albena, Bunite (Varna), Dyuni, Elenite, Pomorie (east beach), Harmanite (Sozopol), St. Vlas (central beach and Venid beach), Sunny Beach (north and south beach) and Sunny Day beach were all recognized for their excellence.











WINTER TOURISM

About 30% of Bulgaria is mountainous. The country's mountains are exceptionally diverse in relief and offer abundant options for relaxation, along with sports and entertainment for tourists, since conditions are exceptionally conducive for tourism in both winter and summer. The ski season in the medium high and the alpine resorts last about 130 days each year, while during the summer months enthusiasts may hike in centuries-old forests. The numerous hotels and the recreation centers provide accommodations for a wide variety of tastes and preferences.

There are well-marked hiking routes through Bulgaria's mountains, such as the southern traverses of the Kom - Emine European trail E-3, the European trail E-4, from Vitosha through Verila, Rila, and Pirin, and the European hiking route E-8, from Rila to the Rhodopes

The mountains in Bulgaria are hospitable all year long, but it must be remembered added that in order to enjoy their beauty visitors need to come well prepared, which includes obtaining information about the routes they plan to use and the meteorological conditions. Visitors should also act responsibly, so as to preserve the pristine beauty of Bulgaria's majestic mountains.

Sofia is Bulgaria's capital and its largest city. Founded thousands of years ago, today the city continues to develop as the country's cultural and economic center. At present, the city has a population of 1,250,000.

Sofia is located in the western part of the country, on The Sofia Plain and on the lower slopes of Mount Vitosha. The city's average altitude is 550 meters above sea level, the climate is moderate and continental, characterized by cold winters and relatively cool summers. The average temperature in January is 1 degree below zero Centigrade, and the average July temperature is 20 degrees Centigrade.

The city is located at a strategic crossroads. The route from Western Europe to Istanbul passes through Sofia via Beograd and Skopje, then through Plovdiv to Turkey. Sofia also connects The Near East and The Middle East, lying between the banks of The Danube and the shores of The White Sea on the one hand, and between The Black Sea and The Adriatic on the other.


Sofia has been settled for many millennia. In honor of its hot springs, in the 8th century BCE the Thracian tribes settled here gave the city its first name — Serdika or Serdonpolis.In the 1st century BCE, Serdika was captured by the Romans, who transformed it into a Roman city. During the reign of Emperor Marcus Ulpius Trajan (reign 98-117 CE), the city took his name, Ulpia Serdika, and became the administrative center of the region. Serdika was the favorite city of Constantine the Great (reign 306-337), who said "Serdika is my Rome." In roughly 175, massive fortified walls, with four watchtowers were built to protect the city, and a second outer fortified wall was added during the 5th-6th centuries. The city's flourished for a second time under Justinian the Great (reign 527-565).

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t the beginning of the 9th century, the Bulgarian Khan Krum (reign 803-814) invaded Serdika. The city became an inseparable part of The First Bulgarian Empire (7th - 9th centuries) under Khan Omurtag (reign 814-831). At this time the city was renamed Sredets (The Center), because of its central strategic location. From 1018-1094, Sredets was under Byzantine rule, but still remained an important strategic, economic, and cultural center. During the time of The Second Bulgarian Empire (1185-1393), Sredets took on the appearance of a large Medieval city – its narrow, crowded streets witnessed the construction of more and more small churches and monasteries, which later became Sofia's Holy Mountain. The city gained its present name at the end of the 14th century, in honor of the city's major symbol, The Saint Sofia Basilica.

Sofia preserves many valuable monuments to its long and storied past. Visitors exploring the city's streets can see remnants of The Eastern Gate from the days when Sofia was Serdika and Sredets, dating from the 2nd - 4th centuries AD. These remains are exhibited in the underpass connecting the Presidential Palace and The Ministerial Council, surrounded by shops selling traditional Bulgarian souvenirs and rosewater.

Sofia is also home to Bulgaria's most prestigious and larges educational institutions — universities, colleges, and middle schools that offer solidly-grounded, up-to-date instruction in such disciplines as Architecture, Medicine, The Humanities, Engineering, Music and Choreography, and Fine Arts.

The city's annual celebration is observed on September 17, in honor of the martyrdom of Saint Sofia and her three daughters Vyara (Faith), Nadezhda (Hope), and Lyubov (Love).



1. Is the use of credit cards wide spread?

In large stores, hotels, and catering and entertainment establishments, the following credit cards are generally accepted: Visa, MasterCard, American Express and Diners Club. In smaller stores, hotels, and catering and entertainment establishments, it is necessary to pay in cash.

2. What currency is used for daily transactions in the country?

At present, only lev (BGN) is accepted. The official currency of the country is the lev, which is equal to 100 stotinki). Fixed currency rate: 1 EUR = 1.95583 BGN

3. What is the best way to exchange currency?

All banks and licensed exchange offices are suitable for exchanging currency.

4. Where are the international airports in the country?

There are international airports in Sofia, Plovdiv, Varna and Burgas. Direct charter flights are available to the Black Sea airports in Varna and Burgas during the summer season.

5. Which are the mobile operators in the country?

Vivacom, Mtel and Telenor. They cover the entire territory of the country. They maintain 2G, 3G, 4G networks.

6. What are the speed limits for motor vehicles in Bulgaria?

50 km/h in populated areas; 90 km/h outside populated areas; 140 km/h on limited access highways.

7. What is the country's emergency telephone number?

In the event of a medical emergency, call the toll-free telephone number **112**. This is also the number to call for any other emergency. The number can also be reached outside the range of your mobile network. The **112** operators also speak languages other than Bulgarian.

8. Bulgaria is located in which time zone?

Bulgaria is located in the Eastern European Time Zone, which is GMT (Greenwich Mean Time) +2 hours.

9. What is the electric voltage in the country? 220 V, 50 Hz.

10. Can I rent a car in Bulgaria?

Visitors can hire motor vehicles from one of the international rent-a-car companies such as Hertz, Budget, Eurocar, and others. Also, many hotels now offer this service through licensed Bulgarian car rental companies.

11. What is the climate in Bulgaria?

The climate in the country is temperate continental, with Mediterranean influence in the southern parts. The Black Sea influences the climate in the eastern part of the country. There are about 2,000 sunny hours from May to October. During the winter, the mountains are particularly suitable for winter sports.

12. Which season is best for visiting the country?

The most appropriate time for a visit depends on the reason for your trip. The most suitable months for skiing are December, January, February and March. If you are interested in visiting the Black Sea beaches – June, July, August and September. If you are a hiker or camper, the most appropriate times are the late spring, the beginning of summer and early autumn. Any time of year is a good time to visit one of Bulgaria's many spa resorts.

13. Which are the largest sea resorts?

Sunny Beach, Golden Sands, Albena, Dyuni, Elenite, MMC Primorsko, St. Konstantin and St. Helena and the cities of Varna and Burgas.

14. Which are the country's best-known mountain resorts?

 $Bansko, Borovets, Pamporovo, Chepelare \, and \, Vitosha.$



15. Healthcare Services

Interested parties may obtain more information about healthcare and the conditions for using healthcare services paid by public funds in Bulgaria by visiting the site of the Ministry of Health (www.mh.government.bg) and the site of the National Health Insurance Fund (www.nhif.bg/).

Medical care for foreigners who are residents of the EU, EEA and Switzerland (Austria, Belgium, Great Britain, Germany, Greece, Denmark, Estonia, Ireland, Spain, Italy, Cyprus, Latvia, Lithuania, Luxemburg, Malta, Poland, Portugal, Romania, Slovakia, Slovenia, Hungary, Finland, France, the Netherlands, Czech Republic, Sweden, Iceland, Norway, Lichtenstein, Switzerland).

Citizens of any of the above member states who are visiting or residing in Bulgaria have the right to avail themselves of their health insurance. When obtaining medical care, they need only visit a medical facility or diagnostic laboratories that has concluded a contract with the National Health Insurance Fund (NHIF), or any of the state or municipal medical institutions (see the file entitled Healthcare Establishments Register) that are supported by the Ministry of Health. Tourists in Bulgaria can inquire with staff at hotels to gain information about medical care and treatment, and it is the obligation of hotels to provide a list of the addresses of medical facilities and doctors who contracts with the NHIF. (Please note that he healthcare specialists working at hotels often do NOT work with the NHIF, and their services are generally expensive.)
